This pay-as-you-go option will allow account holders to make smaller payments, with a \$30 minimum, to keep their service connected. This program will also offer members an option to make more frequent payments in smaller amounts to keep services on.

Call Center Moves to Topeka

On July 5, the call center moved to the Topeka office. This means members who dial any co-op number will be assisted by a member services representative at the West District office. This update will allow for improved efficiency as we begin to upgrade telephone software designed to provide more services to members, as well as comply with federal regulations.

Pay-By-Phone Clarification

To comply with new regulations in the credit card industry, LJEC can no longer take payments over the phone, effective June 1, 2016. The new regulations will help keep our members' information safer while allowing the co-op to continue offering multiple forms of payment.

The Pay-by-Phone system is one of several ways you can pay your bill. You can still make a payment by mailing a check, paying online, or stopping by the office.

LIFC offers its members a load management option. The "Wait Until 8" program includes a special meter that gives you the opportunity to save on

your electric bill, simply by adjusting your power consumption habits

LIEC is charged a premium by our power supplier

for energy consumed during the peak hours of 3 to 8 p.m., Monday through Friday. The time of use rate encourages you to conserve energy during neak hours. This rate is designed to keep your bill approximately the same as if you were on LJEC's regular rate. Any effort on your part to cur-

tail consumption during peak hours will result in savings on your bill. How can you adjust your habits?

Wait until after 8 p.m. to run large appliances, like the dish washer, washer or dryer, or to adjust your thermostat to a cooler setting.

Timers are available for purchase from LIEC to help you control appliances such as dehumidifiers, pool pumps and electric water

If each member does his or her part, the result will be a lower power bill from our supplier, and that means overall savings for our members

Save Money by Lowering Peak Demand



ages our members to evaluate their electricity consumption and practice energy conservation that will help the cooperatives with peak control. With your cooperation, we can help control the cost of power and reliability.

The best times to practice energy conservation are Monday through Friday between 4 and 8 p.m. from June 1 to September 30 because the peak electricity demand for those months drives the electricity billing for the remainder of the year.

We ask that you be aware of days that have temperatures forecasted above 95 degrees, when peak demand typically occurs. This means we are not only looking at higher billing rates, but also have a higher risk of reliability issues.

When you consume electricity at any given time it is known as "load." Kaw Valley and LJEC add up the electric consumption from all

Co-op Youth Experience Our Nation's Capital

Cooperative-sponsored youth recently attended the 56th annual Electric Cooperative Youth Tour to Washington, D.C., from June 9-16. Each year cooperatives select area youth for this opportunity as part of our strong commitment to the community and our mission to inspire future generations to become leaders.

JACHIN DRINKARD, Denison, a senior at Valley Falls High School, was selected by Leavenworth-lefferson Electric Cooperative, Kaw Valley Electric was represented by CAMRYN MATHIS. Lawrence, a senior at Bishop Seabury Academy, and REBECCA STOR-MANN, Topeka, who will be a senior at Washburn Rural High School.

These three students joined more than 1,700 other high school students nationwide to visit with their state's senators and members of Congress, tour historic monuments and memorials, and hear from several speakers, such as Olympic Gold Medalist Mike Schlappi.

This year's delegation of 36 Kansas youth and four Hawaii youth began its trip on June 9 with a banquet in Topeka featuring youth tour alumni Mike O'Neal, former Speaker of the Kansas House of Representatives Brant Laue Chief Counsel for Gov Sam Brownback, Rep. Steven Johnson and Rep. Kyle Hoffman; and a night tour of the Kansas State Capitol. Before flying to Washington, D.C., the delegation had

While in Washington, D.C., the students met with Congressman Tim Huelskamp and Congresswoman Lynn Jenkins. They also visited with Sens. Pat Roberts and Jerry Moran after their tour of Capitol Hill.

This trip opens the eyes of many students to future possibilities in leadership roles, while building lifelong friendships. The delegates also visited the Holocaust Memorial Museum, Smithsonian Museums, Mount Vernon, Arlington National Cemetery, attended a professional baseball game at the Nationals Park, and had a laugh at the production of Shear Madness at the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts.

A unique and surprise turn of events also occurred on this year's trip. Delegates had the opportunity to see the 14th Dalai Lama of Tibet while visiting the Capitol, watch from a distance as presidential candidate Donald Trump boarded his plane at the Ronald Reagan Washington National Airport, and witnessed a vote in the Senate Gallery with several well-known senators who have also been a part of the current presidential campaign.
