- ✓ Small Generating Facility is inspected by electrical inspector as required by local code or by a Professional Engineer or electrician licensed in the state of Kansas (See Terms and Conditions for details)
- ✓ Member returns completed Small Generating Facility Certificate of Completion to FreeState
- ✓ FreeState representative inspects Small Generating Facility
- ✓ FreeState installs proper electric
- ✓ FreeState approves parallel operation of Small Generating Facility and returns signed Small Generating Facility Certificate of Completion to Member

Protect Your Investment

FreeState Electric Cooperative has received applications for new wind and solar Co-Generation Projects. Co-generation projects include any project

generating electricity along with the grid, usually solar or wind. It is also known as net metering.

Some of these projects have been built by installers before the approval process needed through FreeState Electric has been completed. Failure to get approval before building could become a significant safety and monetary hazard if your application does not meet our guidelines.

Most home renewable projects list to the left for step-by-step

rely on a connection to the electric grid to both operate and provide the necessary return on investment. Grid connection is necessary to obtain power when your co-generation is not producing and to push any excess generation back onto the grid.

The bottom line is FreeState must approve all applications for grid interconnection.

FreeState encourages all members to check with the co-op to make sure protocol is followed when installing home renewable projects such as wind turbines or solar panels. Application approval for your Co-Generation Project will help protect you, your investment in renewable energies, and our employees.

Give Safety a Shot this Hunting Season

Hunters have their sights on wild game of an accident. when preparing for hunting season. FreeState Electric urges hunters to take precautions when preparing for hunting and be aware of potential electrical hazards while hunting. A few moments devoted to safety can help prevent an accident with utility equipment.

Before leaving for a hunting trip, make sure you have safety items to signal for help in case of an emergency. Always carry emergency supplies—cell phone, whistle and flashlight, for example—in the event

Note the location of power lines and other electrical equipment before you begin a hunt. Be especially careful and observant in wooded areas where power lines are easy to overlook.

Obey all signs or postings that advise electrical safety, especially when selecting the location of a tree stand. Tree stands are the leading cause for hunting injuries. If you are using a tree stand, make sure you read the manufacturer's instructions and inspect the stand for wear before use.

When setting up and taking down the stand, make sure you do not make contact with any overhead electrical equipment. Never use power poles to support a tree stand. Look for an ideal tree for your stand, one that is sturdy and healthy. When setting up a stand, keep at least three points of contact while you climb.

Never shoot nearby power lines or other electrical equipment. A single shot can cause vast damage to the electrical system and can result in power interruptions and physical risks to those nearby.

Seasonal Safety Tips Space Heater Safety

Space heaters are commonly used to stay warm during the winter as they are quick to heat a room and localize it. However, with the convenience comes danger when not used properly.

"More than 32 percent of home heating fires are caused by space heaters." said Matt Lambert. FreeState Electric's energy use coordinator. "Even worse, 80 percent of home heating fire deaths involve space heaters."

To avoid potential hazards when using space heaters take the following precautions:

■ Make sure your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors are in good working condition before using your space heater.

Place space heaters out of high-traffic areas and on a level, hard, non-flammable floor surface—NOT on carpets, furniture or countertops.

Keep space heaters at least three feet from combustible liquids and flammable items like fuel, spray cans, paint, draperies, blankets and sofas.

Do not overload circuits. Never use extension cords or multiple plugs with a space heater, and make sure the unit is not plugged into the same circuit as other electric appliances.

■ Never leave space heaters **unattended**. Turn off and unplug your space heater before leaving the room or going to bed.


